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## Court Rules in Favor of Local U.S. Citizens and Documented Immigrant Youth: Granting Equal Access to Driver's Licenses and Ohio IDs

CINCINNATI, OH - Today, a federal District Court Judge, confirming a decision made last week, ruled that the Ohio Bureau of Motor Vehicles cannot deny driver's licenses and Ohio identification cards to otherwise eligible U.S. citizens and documented children of foreign-born parents because of the parents' immigration status. This ruling comes after the Intercommunity Justice and Peace Center (IJPC) discovered that minors who were applying for their driver's license were being unlawfully turned away due to their parent's immigration status as a result of a discriminatory BMV policy. The class action lawsuit won by Advocates for Basic Legal Equality (ABLE) will improve the lives of thousands of U.S. citizens and documented immigrant youth living in the state of Ohio.

IJPC will discuss the ruling and what it means for Ohio and its impact on local youth at a news conference at 3:00pm on Wednesday, February 26 at its offices at the Peaslee Neighborhood Center at 215 East 14th Street in Cincinnati, Ohio.
